Through dedicated CIS Site Coordinators, we provide wrap-around services to our 11,000 students at our 11 schools, all designed to mitigate barriers to education. Compared to other youth-serving organizations, our model is unique because our staff is embedded in the schools, and work in tandem with the schools' principals, teachers, and partners to bridge the gaps in real time.

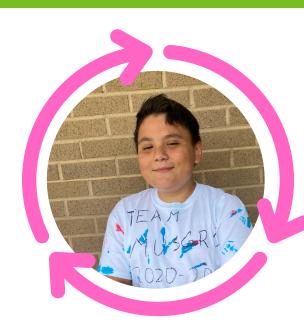




FIVE BASICS

Our services look unique in each school. However the common thread is our belief in the Five Basics. These are essentials that every child needs to succeed:

- 1 a one-on-one relationship with a caring adult
- 2 a safe place to learn and grow
- a healthy start and healthy future
- a marketable skill to use upon graduation
- a chance to give back to peers and community



OUR IMPACT

CIS's work is to level the playing field for our most at-risk students in the schools we serve - with the ultimate goal of creating equity in education and subsequently, promoting equity of opportunity after graduation. Given that 42% of our students are Black, 37% are Latino, and among all students 84% are from low-income households, we are supporting the most vulnerable, minority students in the county. Our students are those experiencing the most severe challenges and barriers from poverty, trauma, and other stressors. Research directly links these challenges with decreases in graduation rates, which is why we focus on the three key indicators of dropping out: Attendance, Behavior, and Academics.

In the 2021-2022 School Year, CIS-C case-managed students experienced the following improvements:



POSITIVE REINFORCEMENTS

During the pandemic, when our students were primarily learning from home, remote learning meant social isolation for our students - they were away from their peers, routines, and activities. All of these issues preparented severe social and emotional challenges, which we really began to see more clearly when students returned to schools in the 2021-2022 academic year. There was greater need to renew confidence, social skills, social and emotional learning, and conflict resolution skills in our students. One of the most successful examples was a new program at Falling Creek Elementary.

Site Coordinator, Ms. Harrison, and the Associate Principal, Ms. Dillingham, established the Strong Girls Group - to teach skills, develop self-confidence, and promote a servant-leader mindset.

The group of young ladies met with Ms. Harrison and Ms. Dillingham once a month to discuss a different theme like:

- Strong girls know they are loved, so they can love others
- Strong girls serve others
- Strong girls have entrepreneurial skills

The Strong Girls completed a number of different projects around these themes, including a school-wide service project, where they assembled "winter kits" for their fellow students, who needed gloves, hats, and warm socks. The outcomes and impact of the Strong Girls Group has been powerful for its participants - Ms. Harrison has seen these young ladies improve their attendance, grades, and behavior!

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

We believe that every child possesses a unique set of skills and strengths. This mentality drives our asset-based approach, and our 5th Basic - a chance to give back to peers and community. Our Site Coordinators see their students for their potential and not just their challenges. In this way, our model helps students build confidence, gain life skills, and develop positive self-coping, all of which empower and prepare them for educational success. While some of our leadership empowerment work looks like a formal group or curriculum, other times it happens organically among students and their CIS Site Coordinator, like the highlight from Meadowbrook High School below.

For Meadowbrook's All Site Volunteer Week project, students took the lead! Three IB Seniors worked with our CIS Site Coordinator, Ms. Greenwood, to organize the entire project. From writing the volunteer description to identifying their supply needs, the students designed a project to paint and place rocks around the school's athletic fields that included messages of hope and encouragement. Together with community volunteers and other students, the group created beautifully painted rocks, which now serve as reminders to all students to keep working towards their goals! Thank you to all the great volunteers who helped!



REENGAGEMENT

According to research done by Bellwether Education Partners, as many as 3 million students went "missing" during the pandemic—not from home, but from virtual school or in-person classes. Communities In Schools of Chesterfield had an incredible opportunity to hire three Reengagement Coordinators to respond to this crisis. Our Reengagement Coordinators worked with students at each of our three high schools, doing intensive work with smaller caseloads of students, who had disengaged and were off track from graduation. This one-on-one support included goals such as setting post-secondary plans (college, trade schools, job placement, etc.); helping students create their own pathway to success; and completing a high school diploma or equivalent. One of those students is Ana, who worked with LaTrina Lee (Reengagement Coordinator, Meadowbrook High). Hear her story and how Ms. Lee supported her to receive her diploma by watching the video linked to the QR code.

SUCCESS IN SCHOOL AND BEYOND

Equally important to the work we do to ensure our students experience success in school, is our work to prepare them for success in life, which is tied to developing the CIS 4th Basic - a marketable skill to use upon graduation. Starting as early as kindergarten, our Site Coordinators work on ways to expose their students to post-academic opportunities. We take our students on field trips to local businesses to learn about various career opportunities, organize career speakers to share

with students about their fields, and work with diverse individuals to serve

as mentors to students.

At Carver Academy, Ms. Thompson makes sure her CIS students have the skills to land their dream job. In April of 2022, she recruited volunteers to help conduct mock interviews with students. Participating students sat with the volunteers as if they were truly applying for a job - a great first-hand but low-stakes way to test their skills at what can be a nerve wracking experience!

MAKING IT ALL WORK

Our breadth of existing partners is key to reaching our students. With our direct knowledge of the need within our schools, coupled with our longstanding community relationships, we are able to effectively and quickly get basic needs to our students, match students with mentors, connect students to mental health interventions, and more.

After months of Covid protocols preventing outside partners from entering the school buildings, we were finally able to welcome them back in the 21-22 year. One partner, who exemplifies the powerful impact of the return to in-person support, is Boys To Men Mentoring Network Virginia (BTMVA). Their goal is to give young men a variety of positive male role models who show up consistently and share about their struggles as men.

Ms. Claiborne, our Site Coordinator at Salem Church, can attest to their work. "I have seen my BTMVA students make outstanding changes as a result of their time with their mentors. One student, Christian, said that being a part of BTMVA gives him hope "because when stuff at home gets hard, I can come to Boys to Men and talk about it."

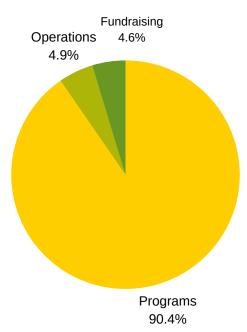


FINANCIALS
